







How do you work with charcoal?

Charcoal is a good art medium to use to create **tones** in your sketches. **Tone** means adding black, or dark colours to your art work. This helps to make your drawings more 3D and life-like. To draw with charcoal, hold it like a pencil to make sharp edges, applying more pressure if you want a darker line. To make softer, broader strokes, hold the charcoal on its side and drag it across your paper. If you want to add shadows to your drawing, use a piece of paper or your finger to smudge the charcoal.



Famous Artist



Dennis Creffield is an artists, whose work is exhabited in the Tate Art museum in Liverpool. He is a Bristish artist, born in London, in 1931, but unfortunately died at age 87. He was well-known for using charcoal and got a lot of his art inspiration from catherderals.



Example Questions

Try to experiment with create light and dark areas to your work by adding pressure to your charcoal and using the blending method to add shadows.
