What is a Traditional Tale?

A Traditional Tale is a story that has been told and re-told for hundreds of years and is passed on through generations. They can also be known as traditional stories or fairy stories. Over time, stories and characters may change, but the themes will remain; good versus evil, kindness and generosity.

More recently, it has become popular to write more modern versions of traditional tales where the character and setting has been given a more up-to-date twist. These versions are fun to read but still contain the same themes as the originals.

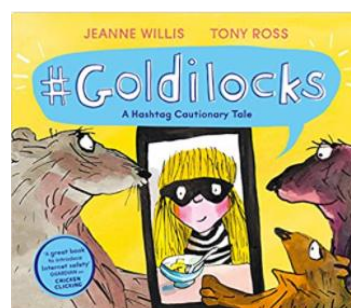

This might be the Wolf from The Three Little Pigs who had a cold and couldn't stop sneezing or the pea who wasn't really happy about being squashed by so many mattresses and a Princess.
